February 2022 marks 50 years since my parents and brother left Havana for Spain before making their way to the U.S. two years later. Exasperated with the static state of more than six decades of dictatorship in Cuba, my dad, in his last years of life, would come to say "I'm an American now" while waving off hope for change.

I carry a sense of responsibility to them and to all who have journeyed around the world, by choice or force, as a reminder of how urgent it is to understand the world we live in through facts and dialogue. At the World Affairs Council of Pittsburgh, we aim to connect the dots between our worlds – both the real and romanticized versions of the places we call home.

In 2021, we launched a new strategic plan and website, welcomed our first cohort of Youth Fellows and Youth Board, and traveled the distance from Pittsburgh to Tokyo in our 90 For 90 virtual challenge. All the while, we sought to humanize global issues through interactive public and youth programming.

This year, we're excited to return to in-person events. We'll be getting back on bikes to explore global ties across our region, celebrating local leaders at our spring soirée with our first-ever Global Impact Awards, and hosting global learning programming for and with people of all ages.



The Pittsburgh Story

When the World Affairs Council of Pittsburgh was founded in 1931, the world was in the midst of the Great Depression. The 1929 fall of the U.S. stock market triggered the longest, deepest global economic decline of the 20th century, with 25% of Americans unemployed. In 2021, 90 years after the Council began, we find ourselves again in a historic moment. The global health pandemic has caused much of the world to retreat, and the health, educational, and economic crises have upended American life in ways that will linger far beyond this year, including in the Pittsburgh region.

In this critical moment, we reassessed how we can best convene and connect people around global issues. The Pittsburgh of today is much different than the Pittsburgh of 100, 50, or even 10 years ago. For example, the Pittsburgh foreign-born population has fallen from more than 25% a century ago to less than 4% today. How does the Council contribute to or reverse these trends? What is our responsibility to antiracism, and what should guide how we view the future of our region, our country, and our world?

Over the past year, we have actively made a commitment to prioritize transformational partnerships, lift up the voices of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) in our community, engage in cross-cultural exchange, amplify youth leadership, and shine the light on other organizations advancing global learning. We are building on our legacy to strengthen the Pittsburgh community as we face global challenges and reimagine our world.
