It goes without saying that the past few years have been defined by change – for the world, for Pittsburgh, and for us.

Three years ago, the World Affairs Council of Pittsburgh was an 89-year-old organization on a trajectory to transform. We seized the disruptions of 2020 as an opportunity to rethink our mission, vision, and our "why." In 2021, we piloted new tools, programs, and ideas to figure out how best to navigate our new world. And in 2022, we put our lessons learned into action – finding our stride and gaining momentum toward the direction in which we want to go.

Over the past year, we've integrated old and new, launching new initiatives while building on the foundation of what's been proven to be effective. In practice, this looks like a few big firsts, such as our first-ever Illuminate Awards and the launch of our digital learning lab, along with tried-and-true classics, like a timely discussion on Russia's invasion of Ukraine with Ambassador John Tefft and our 52nd Annual World Affairs Institute for Student Leaders.

We've refined not only *what* programs we're bringing to Pittsburgh, but *who* we're bringing into the room. Our focus is more intentional than ever on engaging people from all ages, backgrounds, and walks of life, whether by offering discussion space for BIPOC community members, combining a youth and adult conference, or hosting a program in both rural and urban communities.


We know that this work cannot be done alone. Thank you for *Sparking Bold Thoughts* with us and helping to build a world that is equitable and just for all.

A Look Back On The Year

Our work can be summed up in our tagline, "Sparking Bold Thoughts." We aim to ignite a lifelong interest and engagement in global affairs for youth and adults; create diverse and bold learning experiences that generate transformative action; and allow space for in-depth, thought-provoking discussions with global experts. This phrase shapes our programs in classrooms, conferences, and the community.



Engaging Youth

Our youth programming focuses on By-Youth For-Youth events and programs that build advocacy and help youth understand and act on global issues. This takes the form of youth-designed convenings, like our Emerging Global Leaders Conference, and career exploration opportunities like the Global Careers Skills Seminar. This year, we also expanded our learning online with the launch of our digital learning lab where students can develop skills in a social learning environment.

Understanding Policy

Because the U.S. Senate plays an essential role in deciding foreign policy, we saw an opportunity to connect our community directly to policy issues through a Candidate Forum where they could question PA Senate candidates on foreign affairs. We also empowered Pittsburghers to combat misinformation by partnering with the Alliance for Securing Democracy on a program about the strategies, tools, and tactics used to impact voters and divide communities, held both in rural and urban communities.

Sharing Stories

Facts are critical, but stories are how we understand the world around us. We prioritize opportunities for storytelling in our programs – whether during a dedicated storytelling event where folks shared their experiences with Culture Shock, a Welcome Home Celebration for Global Travel Scholars to present their travel stories, or in a casual conversational space for BIPOC community members to gather around global issues in a safe and mindful manner.





Exploring Our Community

We believe getting to know the world around us starts with the world right beneath our feet. Not only is biking a sustainable and accessible way to get around, but the United Nations says that cycling is a tool to help reach the Sustainable Development Goals! We partnered with POGOH as Community Ambassadors to host our second year of community bike rides exploring the influence of global music and art on local identity.

Learning Lab

We expanded our digital youth programming by launching a partnership with CanopyLAB to host globally relevant courses on a new AI-powered social learning lab. We launched two pilot courses, an orientation course for our Youth Fellows and Youth Board and a World Affairs Institute pre-event course on Deconstructing Culture, and also convened three youth design committees to plan new digital programming.

Learning from each other...

Global Minds members from Illinois, Canada, and across Pennsylvania traveled to Pittsburgh for Camp Global Minds! Global Minds is a school-based program that forms cross-cultural friendships between Emerging Multilingual Learners and Native English Speaking students to create inclusive and welcoming schools. Students spent four days learning from each other, making new friends, and exploring what it means to belong, how to gather with intention, and how to lead together. They also explored Pittsburgh with a ride on the Gateway Clipper and a visit to Carnegie Science Center.

While Camp Global Minds students were boarding their flights to Pittsburgh, our Global Travel Scholars were also flying back from their trips abroad. Studying abroad is proven to increase cultural awareness, develop empathy, and improve academic performance. Through our Global Travel Scholars program, 12 high school students were able to reap these benefits with a full scholarship to a program abroad through our partner World Learning's The Experiment in International Living. Eligibility is based on economic need and provides young people with a life-changing experience of traveling outside of the U.S. for the first time to countries like Ghana, Ecuador, South Korea, and Spain.

Our Soiree brought our mission to life, complete with music, dancing, and good food. Spoken word artists and business leaders, changemakers and high school students – people of all backgrounds gathered in a celebration of global learning and connection. Our featured keynote speaker and Council Board Chair Saleem Ghubril said it best: "Tonight we're not talking about the world, we're hosting the world. The world is here right now. Take a look around you. Isn't that a beautiful sight."

THOUGHES

We have seen how people across ages and experiences in the same room spark bold thoughts. And, as we began planning two of our largest annual convenings — our 3rd Annual Summit and 52nd Annual World Affairs Institute for Student Leaders — we reflected on how to create an intergenerational, multicultural experience, and asked ourselves: Why not host both events on the same day, in person?

The day brought together hundreds of students, teachers, and business and community leaders to explore the questions: How are we shaped by our individual and collective cultural identities? What does it mean to be an American or to achieve the American Dream? And how can we build diverse communities and truly build a culture of belonging?

In 2022, Pittsburgh experienced an increase in refugees from Afghanistan, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ukraine, and other countries. To address this timely issue, our sessions deconstructed our views of global migration, humanized the people behind the statistics, and explored how to build inclusive institutions. The day examined the latest demographic data and took an in-depth look at refugee resettlement and implicit bias, incorporating dance and music from local musicians along with stories of immigrants and refugees.

Local leaders, students, and educators joined together for an opening plenary featuring a keynote from Rachel Perić, executive director of Welcoming America. Afterwards, the group split into distinct tracts; students participated in interactive sessions like Cultural Humility Workshop and a Cross-Cultural Simulation, while educators and local leaders attended sessions like Organizational Practices to Support a Culture of Belonging to apply these lessons in their schools and workplaces.

International, we reached high school students and
educators across Pennsylvania and Ohio. Our new
partnership with Vibrant Pittsburgh increased
engagement with local business leaders.








