Many roads lead to the Council, and we meet people where they are, whether in a classroom, conference room, or on a bike trail. Each path to global learning is unique. Here's what a few of these paths looked like in 2023:

- We connected with real people behind policies by lifting up stories that otherwise may have gone untold – whether through theater performances on the Ukrainian migration crisis or a panel discussion with women entrepreneurs on their experience overcoming obstacles to professional success in Japan and the U.S.
- We paved the way for youth to learn to lead by empowering our Youth Fellows and Youth Board members to educate their educators through youth-led adult trainings and expanding our youth-led Global Minds program as far as Hong Kong.

• And we celebrated the power of music to bring people together, as Pittsburghers of all ages and backgrounds danced at our second annual Soiree, dedicated to hip hop's 50 year legacy as a tool of cultural exchange.

The road to global learning

Our immersive and engaging public programming meets people where they are in their learning journeys. This means that learning can happen...



...on a bike trail.

Getting to know the world around us starts with the world right beneath our feet, and the most sustainable way to do that is by bike. Our bike rides deepen our community's connections to global issues and bring neighbors together to explore our shared city. We hosted two themed rides in 2023: Hispanic & Latine Heritage Month Community Bike Ride and Climate Action Community Bike Ride.

Through our speaker series, we invite subject matter experts — with an emphasis on BIPOC and women speakers — for interactive panel discussions, one-on-one conversations, and friendly debates to help Pittsburghers learn clear, trustworthy, and accurate information about global issues. 2023 programs included: The State of U.S. Diplomacy: A Conversation with Ambassador Eric Rubin; Innovation and Women's Entrepreneurship in Japan and the U.S.; A Diplomatic End to the War in Ukraine; and Emerging Global Cities: A Conversation with Dr. Ariel Armony.



...on stage.

We incorporate art, theater, dance, and music to bring to life the people behind policies and stories behind statistics. We hosted Slovo. Theater Group's Mothermotherland play exploring motherhood and the Ukrainian refugee crisis, and CP4P International Productions' performance of I will dance with those oak trees as long as to bring to life the experience of Kurdish women in 1980s Iran.

The Road to Global Learning: Reiko's Story

Raised in a multilingual, multicultural household, Reiko Yamamoto's road to global learning began at an early age. An entrepreneur and artist, she discovered the Council when she was invited to sell her ceramics at a program, Innovation and Women's Entrepreneurship in Japan and the U.S.

She said, "I was surprised and intrigued by the work they do in Pittsburgh, a place I have called home for 12 years. [The Council's] commitment to cultural understanding is much needed in a place that can sometimes feel small." Click to hear Reiko's story!

Attend a Conference

Most students first learn about our youth programming from a teacher or by attending a conference. Designed by and created for youth, conferences like the World Affairs Institute engage students in discussions of key issues in international affairs so that they can understand and think critically about their world.

Study Abroad as a Global Travel Scholar

Our Global Travel Scholars program provides a full scholarship to students with financial need to participate in a summer program abroad. Our eight Scholars traveled to six countries. Along with a trip overseas, this year-long program includes orientation sessions on cultural humility and a storytelling event to share the transformative impacts of travel abroad and cross-cultural exchange. Apply to be a Youth Fellow or Board Member

Our Youth Board and Youth Fellows program focuses on leadership and career development by providing high school students with hands-on professional experience. Fellows work alongside staff members on daily tasks and collaborate with Youth Board members to design and facilitate youth-led trainings for adult allies, educators, and community leaders.

Start a Global Minds Chapter

Global Minds, our flagship youth program, is a school-based program that catalyzes youth-led action for inclusive and welcoming schools. In 2023, we expanded our Global Minds footprint to 16 active Chapters across the U.S., Canada, and Hong Kong!

Community is what gives meaning to people's lives.




